The History of the School

The original school building dates back to 1833 when the school, under the direction of the Church of England Diocese of Oxford, provided education for the children of Theale.

West Berkshire Education Authority now maintains the school and provides for its running costs. The Church maintains its influence in the school by the appointment of Foundation Governors nominated by the Diocese with the support of Theale Parochial Church Council.

As the school has grown over the years there has been a need to extend the building to accommodate the growing number of children in the school.

After nearly two centuries our lovely school still stands next door to the church in the centre of the village and enjoys the respect and popularity of the local community. It has been extended to provide a hall, twelve classrooms, including our Nursery, an ASD and LAL resource and a library. There is a large playground, access to playing fields and a garden.

Leadership

In March 2014 we were designated a Teaching School, a National Support School and our Head teacher a National Leader of Education. This is in recognition of our outstanding work in our school and as leading improvement in other schools locally and nationally. Currently we are leading Enborne CE Primary School and working closely with Newbury College to open a new school in September 2020.

Church School Status

Theale is a Voluntary Controlled Church of England Primary School. As a church school we teach explicit shared Christian values to our children, we try to show them the importance of being committed to a set of values by which we live our lives.

We spend the majority of our Worship time teaching about the Christian faith, beliefs and traditions including: knowledge of the Bible, Christian practices — celebrations in the church calendar and Christian hymns. We visit our local church regularly and on special occasions like Harvest and Easter, and our local vicar comes into school to lead worship each half term. We also teach children about people who have made an outstanding contribution to society.

Some of our assemblies teach the children about traditions and ceremonies in other faiths. The children are encouraged to have a tolerance for cultures and societies other than their own and to respect the beliefs of others. During worship and at other times of the day the children are given the opportunity to reflect and if they wish, to pray. We say The Lord's Prayer together and our school prayer:

In our loving school,
Bring joy to everyone,
Let us all be friends,
Help us to respect and support each other,
Let there be happiness, kindness and friendship.
In our loving school,
We thank you for experience and education,
And opportunities to help us in later life,
Help us to use our abilities in the best way we can,
Let there be trust, friendship and courage.

Whilst we warmly invite and hope that all children will join us for assemblies, you are entitled to withdraw your child from this part of the day. Please make an appointment to see the Headteacher if that is your wish.

Admission Arrangements

If you live outside the area normally served by our school you are advised to visit your designated school first. You are of course most welcome to look around our school as well, do feel free to make an appointment to be shown around and speak to our Headteacher.

The Planned Admission Figure is the number of children who may be admitted to the first year of entry in any academic year. The Planned Admission Figure for our school is currently 45.

Admissions Policy

We follow the Local Authority policy to take children at one point of entry. Children admitted at the start of the September term must by five years old on, or before, 31st August of the following year. These children will be taught the Foundation Stage curriculum. The LA will admit children in each school year up to, but not exceeding the school's Standard Number. If the number of requests exceeds the number of places available, the following criteria apply in order of priority:

- 1. Looked after children
- 2. Children who have exceptional social or medical needs.
- 3. Children whose home address is in the area served by the school.
- 4. Children who have siblings attending the school.
- 5. All other applicants

If we do not have enough places for all the children in one of the above categories, priority will be given to children who fulfil more than one of the admission criteria. If there are still insufficient places, a final decision will be made on the radial distance from home to school. Parents of children who are unsuccessful in gaining a place will be informed in writing on the date laid down by the LA, and will be told of their right to appeal.

Children should arrive at 8:45. We ask parents to ensure that they bring their children right into the school playground in the morning and collect them from outside the classroom door in the afternoon.

Introduction Arrangements

The children in Foundation Stage all join our school in September of the academic year. In the term before your child is due to start school we will invite our and your child to come and visit us for a morning. The children will be able to spend time with other children who will be in their class and their teacher. Parents will also be able to meet the teacher to ask any general questions about school life.

School Meals

Many of our children enjoy school meals which are cooked on site by the company recommended by the Local Authority, ISS on a daily basis. We can offer a varied, nutritious menu including a vegetarian option. If you would prefer your child to bring a packed lunch, we would ask you not to include sweets or fizzy drinks. We are a nut-free school as some children have very severe allergic reactions to nuts.

School Uniform

The basic school uniform can be purchased from many high street shops. Items embroidered with the school logo can be purchased from Tilehurst SchoolWear, either in person at their shop or via their website: www.tilehurstschoolwear.co.uk. Their phone number is 0118 3271060.

We recommend that shoes are both practical and comfortable; trainers should not be worn in the classroom. High heels are not allowed. Sandals must be sturdy and provide some protection to the ankles. Jewellery, novelty hairbands, make up, unnatural hair colour, inappropriate hairstyles (e.g. shapes cut into the hair), and nail varnish are not allowed.

Please make sure that all clothing is clearly named.

The children should have PE kit available every day in school. Kit should be kept in a clearly labelled bag and left in school all week. For health and safety reasons earrings (1 stud per ear permitted) must be removed for PE or Games lessons. It is the child's responsibility to remove them.

Classroom Arrangements

Due to a recent increase of our admission figure, some classes will comprise of children in mixed age year groups. The children are organised in classes according to their needs and teachers are skilled at differentiating work accordingly. Each class has some dedicated learning support time allocated to them. Approximately 24 hours are spent each week on teaching. This does not include time spent on registration, collective worship (conducted daily) and breaks.



Special Needs

All children follow the National Curriculum. The schools policy for special needs includes arrangements for monitoring children with any learning difficulties. After consultation with the parents specific goals and individual programmes of work are set and progress is recorded. The child is supported from within the schools own resources. If a child continues to have difficulties after receiving extra support in school, professional help from others may be sought. Parents will be informed and consulted at all stages of their child's assessment.

The school is also aware that very able children also have special needs and these too will be individually assessed and where necessary, individual programmes will be introduced.

ASD Resource

The Theale Primary Autistic Spectrum Disorder Resource opened in Autumn 2005. The resource takes children from across West Berkshire, who have a diagnosis of ASD and have been referred by the Special Needs Panel. Children in the Resource are based in mainstream classes, but receive specialist support. They may also receive Speech Therapy, Occupational Therapy and Social Skills Classes. We are very proud of the way all our children work together and the warm happy ethos in our school.

Homework

All children are encouraged to read and share books with their family at home. Each child has a home reading record book, which comes back and forth each day, for the parents and teachers to fill in the titles and pages of books that have been read and to add comments.

In addition to daily reading, the children may be given additional tasks to do at home to support their learning. These may include English activities, Maths, investigation and research tasks. Children who have the opportunity to learn to play a musical instrument are encouraged to practise on a regular basis.

Parent/Teacher Contact

We hold two parents evenings every year, one in the first half of the Autumn term and the second towards the end of the Spring term. At the end of the Summer term your will receive your child's annual School Report.

In addition to these formal meetings, we would encourage parents to speak with teachers about any concerns regarding their child. Teachers or team leaders will be able to arrange a mutually convenient time within a short time span. The Headteacher is also available on most days; please make an appointment through the school office.

The Language and Literacy Centre

Within our school is one of two Language and Literacy Centres across West Berkshire as part of the Local Authority's provision for dyslexic children at Key Stage two. Children from across as many as twenty-four local schools visit us weekly to benefit from the expert staff and resources. Pupils attend the centre after a referral from the West Berkshire Special Needs Support Team.

<u>Music</u>

Music is an important part of school life; we have an active and talented choir who perform regularly and a gifted and talented steel pan orchestra. In addition to this there are many opportunities for all the children with regular school productions and music lessons. The school also offers after school opportunities which change on a termly basis.





School Activities

We like to take the whole school on trips that allow them to widen their horizons. Trips we have undertaken in the past include; visits to The Natural History Museum, St Paul's Cathedral, London Zoo and a trip to see Matilda. We also endeavour to take children out of school for class educational trips to really bring the curriculum to life. This will include many 'outdoor learning' experiences, such as lambing at Rushall Farm.

Certain school trips or activities may incur travel costs, fees, admission charges or insurance premiums. To cover these costs the parents will be asked to make voluntary contributions to the school funds. No child will be excluded if their parents have not made a contribution. However, if insufficient money is collected from the voluntary contributions to cover the costs of the activity or trip it may have to be cancelled for all pupils.

A **compulsory charge** can be made in the following circumstances:

- Board and lodging on residential visits whether they take place in or out of school hours. This charge can be remitted for some pupils where there are genuine cases of hardship.
- Optional extras/activities that take place wholly or mainly outside school hours, but which are not provided as part of the syllabus for a prescribed examination and are not required to fulfil statutory duties relating to the National Curriculum or to Religious Education.

Residential visits

A residential five day trip is arranged each year for the Year 6 children and the children in Year 4 spend two nights away at Ufton Court.

Clubs and Societies

The choice and duration of our after-school activities depends on the goodwill of both the teachers and parents.

After school clubs we have also offered, have included netball, football, performing arts, art and craft, film making, gardening, sewing, Cycling Proficiency and cooking.

We do ask parents to let us know each term if there are any clubs they would like us to arrange and are always looking for more fun and exciting activities to offer. If you would like to run a club, please do speak to the Head teacher.

Parent help in the School

Subject to the appropriate safe guarding checks being made, we actively encourage parents to help with their children's education. We welcome any contributions, particularly with the following:

- in the classroom sharing ideas and skills (e.g. cooking/IT)
- shared reading
- after school clubs/activities
- minor repairs and gardening

Safeguarding Statement

Theale C of E Primary School is committed to safeguarding and promoting the welfare of our children and expects all staff, parents and visitors to share this commitment. Stringent checks are made on all staff and volunteers in school. All visitors are asked to sign into reception and may be asked to show identification. Francoise Woolley is our safeguarding governor. The Headteacher is the Designated Teacher responsible for the implementation of Child Protection Procedures. Please report any concerns to the Headteacher.

Additional Information

Transfer to Secondary School

Theale Green has links with Theale C of E Primary School as the Secondary School to which most pupils will transfer in the September following their 11th birthday. However, children do go on to a number of different schools in the area and they make a visit to them in their final term and their staff come to visit them at our school. There is a thorough exchange of information to make the transfer as smooth as possible.

The School and Community

Our school has a special role as a focal point for the local community and in bringing together people of all ages. We invite local groups and individuals to attend our Harvest Service, our Christmas service and our Summer School Production. We care for our community and greatly appreciate and value the support it always gives us.
