# Homework

Homework will be set every Monday and is due the following Monday. Each week, children will be assigned 20 minutes of online practice for both times tables and spellings, using Times Table Rockstars and Spelling Shed. We greatly appreciate your support in encouraging the children to practise these key skills regularly. In addition, we ask that children read at home every day, ideally with an adult, to support their fluency, comprehension, and enjoyment of reading.

## Specialist Teaching

We are fortunate enough to have many specialist teachers across the school. In Year 6, the children will have drama, dance and music on Thursday afternoon, taught by Carrie, Claire and our new music teacher, Miss Lynch. Madame Bastable will teach French language and cultural studies on a Wednesday afternoon. In addition to this, teachers from across the school will be teaching the children in their areas of interest and expertise.

### Outdoor Learning

Children will continue to take part in outdoor learning sessions once every three weeks, on Friday mornings. To ensure they are comfortable and prepared, children will need to bring:

- A suitable coat
- · Hat and gloves, where appropriate
- A change of shoes, ideally wellies that you're happy for them to get muddy

Class teachers will do their best to remind children when their outdoor learning week is approaching. However, if unsure, children are welcome to bring the required items just in case.

The children will have PE on alternate Mondays, as well as a weekly dance lesson with Claire. Please ensure that your child's PE kit is in school all week to allow for any timetable changes. Within their PE kit, the children should have shorts, a white t-shirt and plimsolls for indoor PE and tracksuit bottoms, a sweatshirt and trainers for outdoor PE. They should also have a change of socks. This is especially important for girls who will need to change out of tights for PE. Can I please also ask that, for safety reasons, any earrings are removed for all PE activities as soon as possible after any initial piercing. Only during the 'healing period' will children be allowed to wear tape to cover these.

# <u>Uniform</u>

Thank you for returning your child to school looking so presentable. The smart appearance of our children is often noted by the public. Due to health and safety requirements, it is school policy that all children whose hair is long enough should have it tied up. We also request that children do not have any unnatural colours or extreme styles, for example no stripes or shapes cut into their hair please. Please also note that children should not wear makeup or nail varnish to school. This is in line with our school's uniform policy.

### Water Bottles

We would like to take this opportunity to remind you of the school's policy on water bottles. Children are kindly requested to bring a labelled bottle containing water which they will have access to throughout the day. We ask for water instead of drinks such as squash, as they can be very sticky when spilt and can cause damage to books and equipment. Having water readily available also helps to support our Healthy Schools initiative. The children may, however, have a separate drink of squash or similar (no fizzy drinks or energy drinks please) in their lunchbox. Thank you in advance for your support in this matter.

















### Mobile Phones

We are aware that an increasing number of children now have mobile phones. We would like to remind you of the school's expectations regarding children's mobile phones on site.

If your child needs to bring a phone to school, it must be switched off and placed in their bag before they enter the school gates. Upon entering the classroom, phones should be handed in to the class teacher. They will be returned at the end of the school day, but must not be switched back on until the child has left the school site. These rules are in place to safeguard all children and have been clearly explained to them in class.

Please note that mobile phones are brought into school at the child's own risk. The school cannot accept responsibility for any loss or damage that may occur.
